Parish Council News

The parish council has acquired the red telephone kiosk in Northend for the princely sum of £1. It will be retained in its current position as a feature in the village but BT will no longer provide a telephone service there.

Framed Ordnance Survey maps of the parish and the surrounding area will be placed in the bus shelters at Northend and Turville Heath and on the wall close to the telephone box in Turville.

Jon Bateman, our popular police community officer, left at the end of December to become an officer in the Metropolitan Police. **Michael Wicks** will retire as clerk to the parish council on 31 March 2009. News of both replacements is expected shortly.

On 7 February at the village hall, Dick Tracey (South Central Ambulance Service NHS Trust) explained the benefits of community responders who are trained to help save lives while awaiting an ambulance. For example, community responders can use defibrillators to restart the heart which can be critical to the chances of survival in cases of cardiac arrest.

The parish council, the parochial church council and residents' associations support, in principle, the positioning of defibrillators around the parish if the funds and volunteers can be found.

A Shared Garden

In recent weeks, we have lost two well-loved locals who shared a fondness for the same garden and who, perhaps, are now in another garden.

Sir John Mortimer was well known locally, nationally and internationally as a barrister, author, raconteur and wit. He lived in the house his father built on Turville Heath which was and is surrounded by a wonderful garden. There have been a great many tributes which have focused on both the man and his work. Locally he was known for his efforts to save Turville school and his later support of the use of the school as a holiday home for inner-city children. He also supported many other local activities.

There have probably been fewer tributes to **Filippo Cistone** (pictured below) who sometimes helped in the Mortimer garden. Graham Twemlow writes:

"We were all saddened to hear of Filippo's death at the age of 84. He was a much-loved character who 'gardened' for many people in Christmas Common, Northend and Turville Heath. He came to live in England from his native Italy in 1953. For many years he lived at Shirburn Lodge where he gardened for Mrs Hodgson and, it is said, acted as a waiter for special occasions.

"In the past twenty years, some newcomers found that Filippo continued as their gardener – without asking. Kevin, the erstwhile landlord of the Fox & Hounds told me that, soon after he took over the tenancy, Filippo asked if he could cut the grass, not suspecting that it would lead to such a long-term commitment. No agreement was ever discussed but each week Filippo would mow the lawn and, on occasions, cut back the roses.

"He was a wonderful man."



A Villages Ball?

A few years ago, there was a discussion among a few of us of holding a villages ball. This is a concept seen across the country, whereby the villages of a parish hold a black tie ball for residents and friends. Some of you may have been to the Wargrave village ball - which sells out usually in 24 hours.

Turville Village Association

In the autumn of 1996, parish councillor and local resident John Elmitt floated the idea of establishing a residents' association in Turville. The first series of *Vicar of Dibley* had just been completed and, as with previous projects, negotiations and arrangements had been made through the parish council and the parochial church council. John had the impression that the parish council would gladly hand over the responsibility of filming arrangements to a residents' association, if one could be formed that had the backing of the majority of residents.

Even when I learned that I was the fifth person to be asked, I was more than a little flattered to be given the opportunity to become the first chairman. But I had a real problem with residents' association – it smacked too much of cavalry twill trousers and pink gins. After much thought, the highly original name of Turville Village Association was chosen.

An initial meeting was arranged to gauge the interest. A draft constitution was put forward and eventually formalised three months later. By and large, the majority of residents were in favour, although some felt that it was likely to be factional and divisive. We carried on and here we are, 13 years later, going strong!

The main and most important objectives of the association are to erect a Christmas tree (with lights) on the green, manage filming and organise the annual rounders match against Northend and Southend. Other matters are considered when and if necessary.

A standard contract is used as the basis of negotiations with companies wishing to film in the village. We keep the parish council and the parochial church council fully informed of filming matters. We also keep in touch with other villages that are popular with location managers, to trade ideas on what can be done to minimise inconvenience and disruption and to obtain the maximum benefits.

The vaguely annual general meeting is held at some stage during the year when all members are welcome to discuss the past year's events, make other suggestions for activities and discuss regular events. We are non political and try hard not to be politically correct.

Membership is open to all those resident in Turville village between the Vicarage and Mill House at the western end and the Bull and Butcher and Cobstone Mill farmhouse at the eastern end. Wendy Duerden (who takes minutes), Eric Thurman, Danny Fois (Treasurer) and I form the committee.
