A tale of inter-village competitions

The annual rounders match between Turville and Northend took place on Northend Common on Saturday 23 May. It was a glorious day which encouraged over 50 people to attend. **Danny Fois** and **Steve Blake**, (below) the captains for Turville and Northend, having agreed the rules over a pint, tossed a coin. In what may have been an omen for what was to follow, Northend won the toss and elected to field.

Turville quickly got off to a dominant start, on a pitch which can only be described as 'slow'. They played the game as it was always meant to be played, trying to hit the cover off every ball bowled. A great effort resulted in a record breaking score of 50 rounders, an achievement helped by the fielding of **Guy 'Teflon Hands' Hughes**, who, it seems, has always wanted to reside in Turville. Northend went into bat with the look of a beaten side but soon put themselves in contention with some forceful strikes. However, as Blake knew that 50 was a huge ask, he opted to employ the highly controversial tactic of tip and run, which in the long grass, proved unstoppable



and secured Northend their fifth win in a row. Rest assured, there will be at least one rule change next year! It was a highly enjoyable afternoon. Thanks go to Northend for organising the day and providing the much needed refreshments.

On this occasion, Northend (Bucks) picked up the wooden spoon for last place (no controversy here, then). Northend (Oxon), Southend and a second Turville team settled for a mid-table finish. The quiz raised £700 for village hall funds. Immense thanks are due to quizmaster **Amanda Moser** and to the table tennis group for the organisation, the food and the drinks. 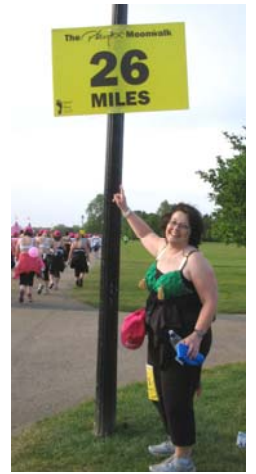

Reflections on Terrorism

Each year during Lent, the churches in the Hambleden valley host a series of talks with a common theme. The theme this year was terrorism. Our area dean, the **Reverend David Picken**, opened the series at Turville with the story of a local community, High Wycombe, and its response to the arrest on suspicion of terrorism of two local men of the Muslim faith. The arrests prompted the setting up of the Christian Muslim council as a way of promoting the common good in the community by the good responsible practice of religion.

David then reflected on what it means to be a Christian in these circumstances and how Muslims and Christians have to find a way of co-existing while proclaiming their faiths. He proposed that for Christians an appropriate response is to follow Jesus' example and accept each person as a unique individual and to practise our Christianity by serving others and the community.

In the second talk at Fingest, **Peter Taylor** discussed the definition of a terrorist from the point of view of a journalist. He described the word 'terrorist' as one of the most emotive and judgemental in the English language, one which defines which side you are on. He seldom used it, preferring words such as 'insurgent', 'resistance' and 'fighter'. The definition is not simple and is subjective, as exemplified by the cliché: 'one man's terrorist is another man's freedom fighter'. It is largely conditioned by circumstances of time, as shown by the life journeys of Martin McGuinness and Nelson Mandela.

Terrorism may or may not be about religion but there is a fanatical commitment to a cause invariably involving 'liberation' of some kind which can only be achieved by violence. Peter proposed that for him, the defining characteristic of terrorism is the deliberate targeting and killing of civilians and concluded by saying that the definition of a terrorist is not straightforward and is fraught with contradictions.

Peter's second talk addressed the response of states to terrorism. Terrorists need support from the community to survive. Where this does not exist the state may be able to defeat terrorism with force, as with Baader-Meinhoff. A community which supports terrorism needs to be persuaded to lessen that support. Grievances and their causes have to be addressed. Of the many tools that may be needed to control terrorism, the most important is political. Terrorists can be encouraged to move into the political arena by promoting the development of their political wing. They have to take their supporters with them as in Northern Ireland where Sinn Fein is now in Stormont. This may be seen as a victory for both sides since the union is maintained.

* Valmai Pickett resigned following the meeting on 13 May. In accordance with s 87(2) of the Local Government Act 1972, unless ten electors make a request to the returning officer at Wycombe District Council for a by-election within 14 days (excluding weekends and bank holidays) of the announcement of the vacancy, the parish council has the power to co-opt a replacement member.
