Introducing Your Community First Responder Team


*After an intensive 2 days of training and assessments the Parish now has an accredited team of Community First Responders. The Team is, front row L to R:- **Amanda Moser, Anne Carroll, Gail Teague**; back row **Peter Teague, Coordinator James McConville** and **Guy Prince**. More volunteers have been accepted by the Ambulance Service to complete the Team and will shortly be undertaking training. We are expecting the Kits to be issued within the next few weeks.*

Community First Responders are equipped with defibrillators, oxygen cylinders, airway management equipment and comprehensive Emergency First Aid Kits as illustrated right. More than 150,000 people die from Cardiac Arrests each year in the UK of which up to 65% could be saved if appropriate treatment is received in time. With every minute that passes the chances of survival decrease by up to 10%. Because it can, at times, take up to 20 minutes for an ambulance to arrive in our Parish, the good news is that a member of the team, who is available on call, will aim to arrive within 8 minutes i.e. well before the ambulance arrives hence the title "First Responder".

First Responders are fully trained and insured by the Ambulance Service and their role is to help support the Ambulance Service, not to replace it. An Ambulance will always be dispatched at the same time as the First Responder. In an emergency the drill is unchanged - dial 999 and ask for an Ambulance. The control room answering the call will know which First Responder is on call and will mobilise them immediately. There is a good chance that they arrive first on the scene. First Responders can only respond to requests from the Ambulance Service so please do not call a Responder directly – just call 999.



There are already over 300 Community First Responders in S Bucks/S Oxon and our team is the first to be established in the Hambleton Valley. We will need at least four, and ideally six, Community First Responder Kits. To provide the Kits fundraising is vital and the team invites ideas and contributions from individuals and organisations in the Parish. Contributions from UK taxpayers can be gift-aided through a registered charity which supports the work of the South Central Ambulance Service Trust. Parish Council News

At its meeting on 16 July, councillors paid tribute to **Valmai Pickett** who stepped down after 30 years service, including seven years as chairman, and presented her with a chair carved from a tree trunk.

Danny Fois agreed to act as chairman for the July meeting. **David Cairns** was co-opted to fill the vacancy (no request had been made for a by-election).

Several Turville residents raised concerns about the recent increase in heavy vehicles passing through the village, many associated with filming at Wormsley. The clerk is contacting the Wormsley estate. Residents are encouraged to collect and share data on heavy vehicle movements.

After considering local opinion, the council decided that it was not in favour of the diversion of the bridleway through Kimble farm. The county council is likely to consult further on this issue.

Following a complaint from a resident, the council reminds parishioners to show consideration for the environment and their neighbours when disposing of garden waste on common land. Fly tipping should be reported to the district council on 0845 3301856.



The White House, Northend

In 1937 the celebrated American poster artist Edward McKnight Kauffer, famous for the avant-garde posters he designed for Shell-Mex and the London Underground, sought a weekend country house in this part of the world. He took out a lease on the White House, Northend, and immediately set about converting an outer stable into his studio. He commuted to and from his main dwelling, a modernist studio apartment in Chelsea, continuing to design posters, illustrate books, and design theatre sets and costumes.

At weekends he and his partner, Marion Dorn (they married in 1950), also an American, a leading textile designer of the time, would drive down from London inviting all manner of guests but once the second world war was declared they decamped permanently to the White House. They had both retained their American citizenships and were not allowed to contribute in any way to the war effort. Dorn lost her successful interior furnishings business in Bond Street and work completely ceased for McKnight Kauffer.

Life became increasingly intolerable. In a letter to a Bloomsbury friend Dorn wrote:

“In the country, our life is like that of the lilies of the field. Our house is cheerful and comfortable. We brought down many books, and I have the clavichord. We have no money saved so we live on whatever vegetables are in the garden, wild blackberries and wild rabbits. We have enough clothes to see us through the winter. Betty is here and a cockney boy is billeted on us, who collects the firewood from the neighbouring woods”.

During the 1920s and 1930s Kauffer and Dorn were at the centre of London’s arts and literary society. Aldous Huxley of *Brave New World* fame was a close friend. Kauffer was even closer to the poet, dramatist and literary critic T.S Eliot and invited him to visit the White House. In reply Eliot wrote:

“Now about the White House. Nothing would give me more anticipation of content than the prospect of another visit to Mr and Mrs Roosevelt”.

He visited the weekend of 7-10 June 1940. During this time he sat in the garden and drafted a poem, which later appeared as *Defense* [US spelling] of *the Islands* first published in 1941 in a book that

accompanied the *Britain at War* exhibition held at the Museum of Modern Art in New York.

Only three weeks after Eliot’s visit Dorn and Kauffer were advised by the American embassy to return to the USA. They abandoned everything, books, paintings, furniture etc, and set sail on board the S.S. Washington. On 12 July 1940 July Kauffer wrote to a friend:

“Tomorrow we land in New York with £20. A whole career and a third of ones life left behind [Kauffer had lived in Britain for 26 years]. No peaceful White House, no life again in the country”.

He loved the White House and continued to write about it in his notebooks. In homage to Kauffer his good friend Marianne Moore, the eminent American poet, embedded one of his sentiments in her poem titled *Icosaphere*.

“In Buckinghamshire hedgerows
the birds nesting in the merged green density,
weave little bits of string and moths and feathers
and thistledown
in parabolic concentric curves”

Soon after Kauffer’s departure the White House was once again inhabited by artists. Hubert Wellington, the recently retired principal of Edinburgh School of Art and his wife, Irene Wellington, an acclaimed calligrapher, lived there until 1967.
