## Protecting the Village Green

For several months, the parish council and Turville village association have been considering how to deal with vehicle damage to the green in Turville. The village association identified several possible solutions including the use of a grass paving system. At the November meeting, Ray Jones reported that seven quotes had been sought for a core grass reinforcement system but only one supplier (R J Symes) had provided a quote. The resulting expenditure of £2,500 to £3,000 represents a 50% increase in the precept, and, hence, the council tax payable by parishioners in 2013/14.

The council discussed, but did not approve, the proposal at its November meeting. It will consider the proposal again at its meeting on 9 January. In the meantime, the council is seeking the views from the Turville village association and other parishioners on both the proposal itself and whether it should be funded through the precept/council tax or by some other means.

## Defibrillators in Telephone Boxes

In July, the parish council and the village associations received a consultation paper on the possible installation of defibrillators (AEDs) in secure, heated storage boxes in the red phone boxes in Turville and Northend. The parish council, which owns the phone boxes, had no objection to their use for this purpose.

### *The Operation of the AEDs*

The use of an AED is most beneficial within five minutes of a sudden cardiac arrest. The first action should always be to call 999 and begin cardio-pulmonary resuscitation (CPR). The emergency services telephone operator will give the code to access the AED and despatch an ambulance and any available community first responder. If there is a second person available, they should fetch the AED. The AED automatically determines how much electricity to use and talks you through how to use it. Although AEDs can be used by untrained people, the intention is to hold training courses in the parish on giving CPR and using the AED.

### *Funding and Costs*

The AEDs are already available in the parish and were paid for as part of the community responder scheme. The storage boxes are provided by the Community Heartbeat Trust. BT will pay up to £75 for their installation in each phone box. BT will also fund the supply of electricity to the phone boxes for the first seven years. Replacement batteries and defibrillator pads can be paid for from funds held on the parish's behalf by the South Central Ambulance Service (SCAS) until such time as the funds run out.

The community will have to fund the following either out of funds held by SCAS or through fundraising:

- the maintenance of the phone boxes;
- the repair or replacement of the heated storage boxes in the event that they are damaged;
- replacement batteries and pads; and
- electric power to the boxes after the first seven years (£3 to £30 per year).

### *Organisation and Maintenance*

**Peter Teague** has volunteered to be the overall coordinator for the scheme. Peter will also organise the appropriate training once or twice a year and liaise with SCAS. We also have volunteers who will monitor the condition of the Turville and Northend AEDs.

## Winning Ways in England and Portugal

Turville Park enjoyed an extremely successful summer, recording 12 wins, just 4 losses and 7 draws out of 23 completed fixtures. Seven games were cancelled due to rain. These results compare very favourably to previous years and are a reflection of the consistently competitive teams which Turville is able to produce.

Unperturbed by flight delays, airport strikes and fears of being stuck abroad, 15 players plus wives and girlfriends spent an extremely enjoyable weekend in Portugal. In between visiting the cultural highlights of Porto they played two extremely competitive fixtures, recording victories in both. With fifties for **James Hunt** and **Oli Thornton**, wickets shared between 11 bowlers and even a couple of run outs, it's hard to isolate a particular highlight, although **James Thornton's** five wickets for three runs undoubtedly swung the second match in Turville's favour.

The Turville playing contingent has remained at a healthy level with 48 players facing at least one ball this summer and 34 bowlers being used. Several new faces joined the club. This summer has also seen the "youth policy" begin to reap rewards with **Charles Henry**, **Raif Dickie** and **Jack Rogers** bowling economically and contributing vital runs.

A pleasing aspect of this season has been the number of players producing either match winning or match saving performances. Twenty half centuries were scored (up from 15 in 2011) and 30 bowlers took at least one wicket. **James Hunt** (566 runs) has, again, been the leading run scorer, while **Jon Hancock** led the batting averages with an average of 63.5. **Oli Thornton's** century against Theberton on a difficult wicket stands out as the innings of the summer. Oli showed both poise and patience against the new ball before dispatching it to all parts of the ground en route to a match winning score.

On the bowling front, **Neil Runkel** and **James Hunt** tied for leading wicket-taker (22 each). Remarkably one in every four overs bowled by **Tom White** was a maiden, a statistic undoubtedly helped by the most impressive bowling performances of the summer: 8 overs, 7 maidens and 8 wickets for just 4 runs to leave Ibstone's batsmen confused, perplexed and somewhat baffled.

## Don't Let It Happen To You

At this time of year, many homes are in darkness from early evening, making them an easy target for burglars. Please use light timer switches to make properties appear occupied in the winter evenings – or leave a light on, but not just in the porch.

Ensure you make it as difficult as possible for an offender to gain access to your property. Shut and lock gates where possible. Consider installing fences or prickly hedges to stop unknown persons gaining entry to your back garden.

Make sure ladders, tools and any equipment are property marked. Avoid leaving valuable items such as sat navs, mobile phones and even loose change on display in vehicles on driveways. Ensure that expensive items in the home are not left in clear view to passers-by.
